Ohana Group Discussion Questions: Week of October 13th, 2024

OVERVIEW

In 1 Corinthians 6:12-20, Paul reminds the Corinthians that their bodies are not their own, but temples of the Holy Spirit, bought at a price by Christ's sacrifice. Therefore, believers are called to honor God by rejecting sexual immorality and living in a way that reflects their identity as members of Christ's body, set apart for His purposes.

OHANA TIME!

Icebreaker: If you could have any superpower, what would it be and why? **Or** What's your favorite way to spend a day off?

Activity: Plan a Thanksgiving activity together!

PRAYER

Pray as a group: Your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit. Pray that you would be able to steward your body in the way of purity and holiness that honors God.

QUESTIONS: 1 CORINTHIANS 6:12-20

1. What problem is Paul now addressing in this passage?
2. What does this passage teach about how we should view and treat our bodies in relation to our faith?
3. How can understanding that your body is a temple of the Holy Spirit change the way you approach your everyday decisions and lifestyle choices?
4. In what ways does society's view of the body conflict with the biblical view Paul presents here?
5. How does Paul's reminder that "you are not your own; you were bought at a price" challenge our view of personal freedom and responsibility?
6. What practical steps can you take to honor God with your body, especially in areas of purity, health, and self-discipline?
7. What does Paul's teaching about sexual immorality in this passage reveal about its spiritual impact, not just its physical consequences?

APPLICATION

1. How can this passage help you develop a deeper sense of stewardship over your body and its use for God's purposes? How can you better honor God with your body in your daily habits, choices, and relationships? How can you resist the cultural pressures around you that promote unhealthy or unholy uses of the body?
2. How can we, as a family, an Ohana Group, or the church, encourage one another to live lives that reflect the truth that our bodies belong to God?
