Sermon Series: The Great Power of God Thanksgiving for the Power That is Coming | Revelation 22:7-21

Ohana Group Discussion Questions: Week of November 23rd, 2025

OVERVIEW

Revelation 22:7–21 ends the Bible with Jesus' promise, "I am coming soon," calling believers to live in faithful obedience and hopeful expectation. It offers a final invitation to come to Him and reminds us that all of history rests in His grace.

BIBLE: READ REVELATION 22:7-21

- 1. Three times Jesus says, "I am coming soon." Where do you see these repetitions in the passage? Why might this emphasis be significant?
- 2. What does "Blessed is the one who keeps the words of the prophecy of this book" (v. 7) mean in practical terms? What does "keeping" look like?
- 3. Why does John fall to worship the angel (vv. 8–9)? What does the angel's correction teach about true worship?
- 4. What contrasts do you notice in verses 11–15 (ex. holy/unholy)?
- 5. In verse 16, Jesus calls Himself "the Root and the Offspring of David, the bright Morning Star." What does each title reveal about who Jesus is?
- 6. Verse 17 contains a triple invitation ("The Spirit and the Bride say, 'Come!"). Who is being invited? What responses are expected?

APPLICATION

- When you hear Jesus say, "I am coming soon," what emotions or thoughts arise—comfort, urgency, confusion, longing, fear? Why?
- 2. Are there choices or areas of life (v. 11) where you sense Jesus calling you toward greater holiness or faithfulness as you wait for His coming?
- 3. The Spirit and the Bride invite people to "Come." How does your life—your words, habits, prayers, relationships—extend that same invitation?
